### Understanding ASL, Deaf Culture, and Basic Signs

#### **ASL DEFINITION**

American Sign Language (ASL) is a complete, natural language.

It is primarily used by Deaf and Hard of Hearing communities in the U.S. and parts of Canada.

#### DEAF CULTURE VALUES

Core values of Deaf culture include community, visual communication, and shared experiences.

Etiquette emphasizes maintaining eye contact and respectful interaction.

#### (VISUAL LANGUAGE FEATURES)

ASL is a visual language characterized by hand shapes, movements, and facial expressions.

It has distinct grammar and syntax, including non-manual markers.

#### HISTORICAL INFLUENCES

ASL was influenced by French Sign Language and American home signing systems.

Key figure Thomas Hopkins Gallaudet played a significant role in its development.

#### BASIC ASL GRAMMAR

ASL follows a Subject-Verb-Object structure.

Unique pronoun usage is achieved through pointing and sweeping gestures.

**FINGERSPELLING** 

Fingerspelling is used to spell out words using hand shapes. It is essential for proper names and specific terms.

HAND SHAPES

Hand shapes are
fundamental in ASL for
forming signs. Each
letter of the alphabet
has a unique hand
shape.

### A Brief History of ASL

#### **INFLUENCES**

ASL was influenced by French Sign Language and American home signing systems.

These influences contributed to the

development of ASL as a distinct language.

#### **KEY FIGURE**

Thomas Hopkins Gallaudet traveled to France and learned from Laurent Clerc, a Deaf educator.

His efforts were pivotal in establishing ASL in the United States

#### FIRST SCHOOL

The American School for the Deaf was founded in 1817.

It was the first school for the Deaf in the U.S., marking a significant milestone in Deaf education.

#### LANGUAGE EVOLUTION

ASL developed into a fully rich language over time.

Its evolution reflects the cultural and social experiences of the Deaf community.

#### **CORE VALUES**

Community is central to Deaf culture,
fostering connections among individuals.
Visual communication is essential for
effective interaction.

#### **CULTURAL IDENTITY**

Being Deaf (capital D) signifies cultural pride and shared experiences.

The term 'deaf' refers to hearing loss and does not encompass the cultural aspect.

#### **ETIQUETTE**

Maintaining eye contact is crucial during conversations.

Light tapping or waving is an appropriate way to get someone's attention.

#### VISUAL COMMUNICATION

ASL relies on hand shapes, movements, and facial expressions to convey meaning.

Non-manual markers, such as facial expressions, play a significant role in communication.

#### **COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT**

Participation in Deaf community events strengthens cultural ties.

Sharing experiences and stories enhances understanding and connection.

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### ASL Grammar Basics

#### WORD ORDER

ASL follows a Subject-Verb-Object structure.

This structure is different from English, which often includes auxiliary verbs.

#### **PRONOUNS**

Pointing gestures indicate he, she, it, and this.

Sweeping motions signify plural pronouns

such as they, those, and you-all.

#### **GESTURES**

Facial expressions and body posture serve as essential non-manual markers in ASL.




## History Lesson
